#### THE VIEW FROM THE TOP - and - BRIGHT LIGHTS (a combined edition)

This is the time of year when a trending topic in the media becomes the annual year-end "best of" lists. Recent issues of the Wine Spectator and Wine Enthusiast featured their annual Top 100 issues, and the upcoming edition of Robert Parker's Wine Advocate will have a recap of the year in wining and dining too. About five or 6 years ago, I thought it might be fun to create my own "best of" list. I created the Dave's "Top Twenty of BrightWines" list. It turned out to be one of the most popular newsletters of the year! I did the same again the following year, and once again it was very popular. I missed a couple of years in the meantime due to calendar issues with the way the holidays lined up with other events and weekends, but this year I have created the Top 14 of 2104, as reflected by The BrightWines Beacon newsletters.

## The BrightWines Top 14 of 2014 is my listing of the 14 most exciting wines and newsletter themes from the past year here at

**BrightWines - sort of a Dave's Top Picks of the newsletters of 2014**. I list them in order of overall importance/popularity with a slight edge given to topics that are the most recent/current. Since this is a retrospective look at the past year's worth of newsletters many of the wines mentioned are not necessarily currently available (sorry). But with that in mind, and in order to keep the list more relevant to what is in-stock here for current selections, I will include a brief listing of wines that are in-stock now that are somehow related to each of the top twenty selections, in case you want to use the list as guidance for wine purchases this holiday season.

### So without further ado, here is Dave's listing of the "BrightWines Top 14" of 2014

#14: Pinot Blanc. Pinot Blanc is not that broadly planted nor widely revered. It often plays second fiddle to Pinot Gris or to Chardonnay, but for whatever reason I found that several of the best-tasting and best-value white wines of the past year were Pinot Blanc. You may have heard me say something like "I'm loving the Pinot Blanc lately" here in the shop. My newsletters, seasonal sale lists, and offsite events in 2014 featured two Pinot Blanc whites from Italy (Cantina Bolzano Pinot Bianco from Alto Adige and Zamo Bianco from Friuli) two Pinot Blanc from the west coast (Foris from Oregon and The Gardener from California) and one from Alsace. France plus two off-the-beaten path options too - one from Germany (Valckenberg) and one from Lake Michigan (Ship of Fools). That's alot of Pinot Blanc for one year at BrightWines, and I loved them all! \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #14:

#13: David vs Goliath. I don't want to be too self-serving nor too political, but the question I was asked most this past year by BrightWines customers was if the local opening of several national wine/liquor "superstores" would affect business at BrightWines. My answer is "I don't think so, but who knows" and that I will continue to "zig, when the big guys zag" and do my best to keep offering the best wines I can find at a wide variety of prices and styles. I believe there is room in the market for big-box as well as small niche purveyors, and for neighborhood standbys too. I have rarely, if ever, had any complaints about my pricing. If/when I do offer a big name wine, I only do so when I can offer the best pricing (or darn close) in the market. And many of the customer favorites around here are not the sorts of wines that can be found even at superstores (or if they are, they are easily lost in the shuffle). I wrote a newsletter this spring when the first of the superstores opened in town called "chef-driven" wine retail, and I promised to write a "part 2" on that topic at some point. I guess the proof that so far my business continues as normal is that I never did have time to write that part-two. Perhaps I will this winter sometime...

This dry fruit-rich red wine from Portugal comes recommended by both Wine Enthusiast AND Robert Parker's Wine Advocate. Both magazines list it as a \$12 retail wine, yet it's priced at \$8.99 per bottle here. Oh, and BrightWines is the ONLY place in Minnesota you can buy this fun red wine. Yes, BrightWines has this wine exclusively in Minnesota, I bought it direct from the exporter when I got back from my trip to Portugal - a country that is offering some of the best quality/value in the world of wine.

#12: acceptance/demand for truly OFF-the-beaten path wines. This year I have noticed that YOU have noticed that sommeliers and wine writers have been really giving alot of street-credibility (would that be "Somm-cred" or street-cred) to wines from seemingly rare and far off the beaten path. Within just the past couple of weeks I have had 3 different inquires for wines from the Jura/Arbois region of eastern France, plus a request for a top-end white wine from Switzerland's Valais region. Add that the great response I got to the newsletter on the wines from my bicycle trip to Michigan (the Ship of Fools white was one of my best-sellers of the summer) and the Finger Lakes wines that I've featured in-store and at consumer events, and I have to say that this has been a relatively adventurous year for BrightWines customers and I plan to continue the trend in 2015 too. \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #12:

#11. Casual-drinking Italian (reds). Italian red wines are often thought of as dinner wines, or at least wines that need food to show their best. Every summer I have alot of fun with Italian white wines, from Pinot Grigion to more exotic choices, that are just plain fun to drink and are alternatives to Sauvignon Blanc. This year, I found that some of my more popular casual red wines were also Italian. We had fun with bargain (screwcapped) Primitivo, oaky/fruity Montepulciano d'Abruzzo, juicy/purple Nero d'Avola, and several fun Sangiovese and Barbera too. Sure, many Italain reds are "food wines" but this year we found plenty of casual red wine from Italy to love too!

#10: Chateau Lamothe Vincent (Bordeaux). Whether it's the 3 versions of Bordeaux rouge, or their whites or the dry Rose - the best quality/value in Bordeaux this year (with a June newsletter and the recent November/December Bordeaux petite chateaux Bordeaux offer too) the best-selling Bordeaux of the year has been from Chateau Lamothe-Vincent. Jancis Robinson (MW) said of Lamothe-Vincent "This is where the real value in Bordeaux lies" and I could not have said it better. IN-STOCK NOW related to #10: Chateau Lamothe-Vincent **2012 "Intense" Bordeaux rouge** (a) \$14.99 per bottle (\$159.99/case = \$13.33 each)

#9: the return of dry Rose/pink wines. Actually the return to popularity for dry Rose was a few spring/summers ago, but this year definitely saw that trend continue AND saw the continued popularity of dry Rose/pink wines (they are just like white wines but with pink color and made from red grapes) into the winter too. I may not currently have as many options, but the ones I have seem to keep selling even though it's wintertime. That's a good sign for this previously ignored category of wine. \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #9: over half-dozen choices from \$8.99 per bottle to \$19.99 per bottle, including a new 90-point rated Brut Rose sparkling from Washington on order to arrive early next week!

#8: the return of Australian Shiraz. This is truly a return to form for a formerly very popular and reliable red wine category that had pulled a bit of a disappearing act the past few years. With the 2012 vintage, the Aussies have great wines and good stocks to offer. Here at BrightWines I had extensive offerings of Australian wines twice this year, both in spring and in fall, and both offers were widely popular up and down the prices. So popular, in fact, that I find myself rather low on stock right now - but if you are a fan of Aussie Shiraz I do have a bargain one and a 90-pointer from Barossa available. \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #8: Oxford Landing (Yalumba) 2012 Shiraz @ \$6.99 per bottle (\$79.99/case = \$6.67 each) AND Three Rings 2012 Barossa Shiraz @ \$15.99 per bottle (sale, 90 pts W.S)

#7. Languedoc. The past few years have been very good for the French wines, in particular the reds and whites (and rose) of southern France have been successful and popular since the 2009 vintage at least. Way back in January of 2014 I had an MLK weekend flash sale of highly rated reds from the Languedoc and Rhone, then in July for Bastille Day I expanded the selection and focused more on the Languedoc region. 100% of the wines from both of those features had sold out by the end of the season for each, respectively. In order to give equal time to other regions of France, my most recent features have been on Bordeaux (and the seasoanal Beaujolais nouveau)

#6: Portugal. It took over a year, but this October I was finally able to get some of the wines directly related to my wine tour of Portugal from last year into the store and the newsletter. As Wine Spectator editor, Matt Kramer, said this year in his blog: "Portugal is arguably the most exciting wine place on the planet today." He certainly seemd to convince his other wine critics and editors at Wine Spectator, who not only made a vintage Port the #1 wine of the year in the Top 100 - but also included several dry red wines from the Douro region of Portugal on that same list. 3 of the top 10 wines, and 4 of the top 13, on that list were from Portugal, in fact. Wow, that's praise normally reserved for places like France or Italy or California. Here at BrightWines, I did my part. I had vintage Ports galore as well as good values in dry red Douro too over the entire course of the year. \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #6:

#5: Tuscany. I'll be the first to admit that over the 14 year history of BrightWines that I have become well-known for French wines, Chile/Argentina, Washington/Oregon, Australia/New Zealand, and lately Portugal (!) as some of my favorite wine regions to feature. I certainly make a point to annually feature South Africa and Spain too. Naturally, I absolutely often feature wines from Italy. But unlike some wine shops that perhaps are more famously Italian specialists, BrightWines treats Italy as just one piece of the puzzle for Europe. I like Italian wines, and I enjoy featuring them from all of the regions in that fabulous wine country. And 2014 is a year where I think we might have had more fun with Italy than any other in recent memory. I already mentioned down at #11 the popularity of the casual-drinking Italian reds. Well, to start off the "top 5" there is no doubt that some of the best wines, and most popular wines, of the year were from Tuscany! The 2010 vintage led the way, but other recent vintages have kep up the pace. From wines last winter/spring like Bocelli 2010 Sangiovese and Tortarossa and Centine Rosso, to the currently featured Borgo Scopete Chianti Classico and the Poggio al Tufo by Tommasi and the soonto-be-restocked Mormoraia 2012 Colli Senesi, the reds of Tuscany have been some of my best, and best-selling.

#4. the 2012 vintage. There is no such thing as a "universally great" vintage in the whole world of wine, given the diversity of wine regions, climates, and styles of wine around the world. But sometimes a vintage bats closer to 1.000 than most. Here's how Bill Ward of the Star Tribune put it: "Good news for wine drinkers - here's a vintage you can count on. Shop by the numbers. Or rather, shop by one number: 2012." The year 2014 follows two years after 2012, and for many-many wine regions and wineries the new releases tend to be about two "years" after the vintage. I cannot tell you how many great, fun, exciting, popular, rated, ect wines from the 2012 vintage have come through BrightWines this year. And there are MORE to come, to be sure! In fact, rather than list out the many-many wines I have in-stock now from the 2012 vintage, let me just offer an Affordable Luxury example - one of the highest rated red wines in the store. It's a 2012 vintage Malbec from Mendoza, Argentina. Yes, the LUCA MALBEC 2012 is in-stock now! \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #4:

#3. standout one-hit wonders, with staying power. Not every exciting wine in my newlsletter is related to a particular theme. Whether they be "flash sale" wines, or extended-play "one hit wonders" the newsletters and my sale features are always full of great wines that seem to have a great following over the course of weeks and months. This past year was no exception. Remember some of these favorites? VC Cellars dry creek Petite Sirah, Piattelli premium 2010 Cabernet Sauvignon, Chakras 2012 Mendoza Malbec, Light Horse 2012 Pinot Noir, Caymus (40th anniversary) 2012 Napa Cabernet (liter bottles), The Saint Rioja Reserva, Paro Russian River Pinot Noir, among many others! \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #3:

2. off the beaten path - yet staying within California. Raise your hands if you recently visited Paso Robles - or the central coast, or Lake County north of Napa, or Mendocino north of Sonoma. This year I know many BrightWines customers did just that. I heard stories, saw pictures, chatted winery picks, and drank wonderful gift bottles too, all courtesy of folks like yourself who chose to visit California wine country this year - but did not do Napa/Sonoma. The wines that excited customers here in the newsletters and the store also represented some of these fun (and great) other regions of California too. This year my newsletters had features on Lake County (north of Napa) including an in-store meet/greet with the owner of Shannon Ridge and Vigilance, Clay Shannon. We had a "mendo-blendo" feature highlighting Mendocino by way of Steele and Jaxon Keys. Some of the best-selling wines of the year were from Paso Robles (remember all the Midnight Cellars wines, and the Opolo, among others) and some of the best-attended instore tastings were the tastings associated with those themes. We all really enjoyed exploring off the beaten path, yet staying within California!

and the most exciting wine/feature of 2014 at BrightWines...

#1: Red blends. Move over Pinot Noir, hit the sidelines Malbec, definitely not Merlot, and tried-and-true Cabernet just can't compete. There is no question the most popular category of red wine is the category loosely termed"red blends." Whether they are meritage-style Cabernet/Merlot, or the many "old vine red" blends, or field blends or winemakers blends, or "nickname" wines (there are alot of those) it almost doesn't matter. If a good quality red blend is available in the proper price range - it's been a good wine to have on hand. The in-store tastings for the newsletters related to red blends have been popular, and many of the best selling wines of the year have been blends. Admittedly there is nothing magical about a blend, but many of the world's famous wines and regions are blends - but there are plenty of great varietal wines too. But if there was one category of wine that seemed to outsell the rest, this year it would be a red wine blend - and probably from California. Remember some of these favorites? Raymond "R Collection" field blend red, the newsletter on the Triple C blends, Wrangler Red and Vigilance Cimarron by Shannon Ridge, Ca' Momi rosso di Napa, Casillero del Diablo red blend and Devil's Collection red, Jaxon Keyes Farmhouse Red, Horse and Plow Farmstead Red, Opolo grand rouge, and the top-selling wine of my fall sale: Bogle Essential Red (and Phantom too). That's quite a list, and it's just the highlights. Yes indeed, the highlight of highlights for 2014 were the red blends. \*\* IN-STOCK NOW related to #1:
